Dear Families,

Finally, as I conclude my 10th academic year at RPHS and the school looks forward to celebrating its 90th anniversary, I would like to pay tribute to the dedication of the teaching staff who have worked tirelessly right up until the end of term. I would also like to thank our support staff who work so hard with the day to day running of the school and the Governing Body for their ongoing support and commitment. Without such an exceptional team, RPHS would not continue to thrive. I would also like to thank the students for being wonderful ambassadors for the school and our families for entrusting us with your child's education; I remain truly grateful.

Fencing 4 Change Tournament

This term, three students took part in the Fencing 4 Change Foundation Tournament. They had a wonderful time, representing the school fantastically, with one student winning a trophy for being the overall victor of his heat, another student being interviewed by British Fencing and all three coming back with smiles and medals to evidence their hard work over the year.

The students who were selected had been taking part in a 24-week programme, specifically designed for autistic young people, whereby they practiced the art of fencing with two instructors from the Change Foundation every week. They worked on a range of skills which benefitted them in many ways aside from fencing, including developing their confidence, social skills and motor skills.

Fencing is not a sport that is easily accessible to all and to have three autistic students take part in a competition involving other schools - after committing to an extracurricular activity for an extended period of time - makes myself and the school immensely proud!

Well done to all of the students who took part in the programme this year, and in particular the three who represented the school at the tournament. Hopefully there will be the opportunity to run it again next year for another cohort of the amazing autistic students at our school.

KS₃ CHALLENGE WEEK

Year 7 students explored the theme of Migration & Identity, engaging with complex matters such as the economic, social, and environmental impacts of migration; the influence of migration on language and culture and the role of technology and the arts in expressing migrant experiences. One Year 7 student remarked, "I never realised how migration has affected so many parts of our lives — such as the languages we speak and the cities we live in."

Year 8 focused on Climate Change & Sustainability, examining topics from the scientific impact of climate change on ecosystems to the role of activism, sustainable design, and global geography in addressing environmental challenges. One Year 8 student reflected "I really enjoyed my music lesson





where we re-created Blues music to tell a story about climate change."

Year 9 engaged with the theme of Artificial Intelligence, delving into the ethical, social, and technological dimensions of AI. Students discussed the implications of AI in various industries, explored mathematical algorithms behind AI systems and debated whether AI should replace human workers alongside the ethical challenges this presents. A Year 9 student commented, "The discussions really made me think about how AI could change our future and why it's important to be responsible when making new technology."

Challenge Week was a real success in sparking curiosity and strengthening students' critical thinking skills. By examining real-world issues through multiple lenses, Challenge Week enriched students' knowledge and prepared them to engage thoughtfully with current and complex matters.

From Damascus to Raynes Park: A Journey of extraordinary resilience from Dr. Eiad Zinah, who joined us to speak to Year 9



This term, our Year 9 students were fortunate to hear a powerful account of the Syrian refugee experience from Dr. Eiad Zinah. Now a practicing dentist at Bupa Global, Dr. Zinah shared his inspiring journey from Syria to the UK, offering students a personal perspective on the realities of conflict, displacement, and rebuilding a life in a new country.

The talk linked directly to the Year 9 geography topics of conflict and development, as well as the Year 8 topic of migration. Dr. Zinah spoke openly about the challenges he faced fleeing civil war, the emotional toll of leaving home and family behind, and the determination it took to pursue a new life and career in the UK.

His story was deeply moving and eyeopening, helping students connect their classroom learning to real-world events. Through his account, students gained a better understanding of the humanitarian crisis in Syria and the wider global refugee situation. Dr. Zinah also spoke honestly about his experiences

adapting to a new culture and continuing his education, offering a message of hope and resilience.

Following the talk, students engaged in a thoughtful Q&A session, asking insightful questions that reflected their curiosity and empathy. Many commented afterwards on how the talk had deepened their understanding of migration, and how hearing a personal story made the issue feel more real and urgent.

Dr. Zinah has spoken at over 100 schools, and we are incredibly grateful he shared his story with ours. His visit reminded us all that behind every news headline about refugees, there is a human story of courage, loss, and perseverance.

We thank Dr. Zinah for his time and honesty, and for helping our students see the world - and their place in it - with greater compassion and awareness.

CAREERS EVENTS & UNIVERSITY INSIGHTS DAY

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD

To support our students with making plans for their future pathways after RPHS, we have undertaken a number of trips and activities this term, offering insights and opportunities

This term, Year 9s attended an assembly about post-16 pathways, so that they can start to plan what they want to do after GCSEs. This is a theme we will continue to support students with, so they can plan well ahead to make the best decisions.

To mark World Environment Day we invited in a team of civil servants from the Department of Energy Security and Net Zero to deliver an assembly to Year 10s about the work they do around climate change, energy and the environment. Students heard about the role of the Civil Service and the careers they have on offer, and entry routes, including apprenticeships, graduate entry and direct appointment. The Year 10 students have also had taster days to help inform their decision making. A number of them spent time in the sixth form attending sample lessons, while others explored alternatives to sixth form, including a presentation by Access Creative College and a visit to Richmond upon Thames College. The Industry Insight day in July enabled students to experience different work settings including a construction site, professional sports clubs, an early years nursery and a beauty salon to observe employees in a range of jobs.

The whole of Year 12 were invited to attend a visit to Southampton University in July, where they experienced a couple of taster lectures. A smaller group of Year 12s also visited the University of Sussex earlier in the term, hearing a presentation about student life there and taking a tour of the leafy campus, including visiting some student accommodation. A focus this term has also been on developing skills to help prepare for the future, and we hosted Roehampton University, who ran an information session, followed by individual meetings to support students writing their personal statements for their university applications. A group of students also attended workshops delivered by Mr Ainsworth and Mr Casey to develop debating and presentation skills in preparation for university interviews. Year 12 students rounded off the term with work experience week, including placements in settings including local primary schools, Hilton hotels, architecture firms and the NHS.

The school was pleased to be selected by the South London Careers Hub to participate in their Classroom2Careers programme, partnering schools with employers to improve aspirations and social mobility. We have been working with Southern Renewals Enterprise, who were able to provide meaningful work experience placements to a number of our Year 12 students at their Blackfriars HQ, as well as hosting a Year 10 industry insight visit. We are looking forward to creating more opportunities to work with them to give students encounters that will increase their skills in navigating the world of work. Going forward, keeping track of our careers-related activities should be easier now that we have launched our "What's Next? Wednesday" feature on the school's Instagram account. Please keep an eye out for updates!

We've already seen brilliant relationships form between mentors and mentees and received very positive feedback from parents. Thank you to all of our peer mentors for your dedication, your efforts are very much appreciated, and we look forward to continuing the project next year!

In May, staff also took part in important training on masculinity and the challenges boys may face in today's world. This session encouraged thoughtful reflection and discussion and was well received across the staff body.

June has been just as active. After the half term, staff were offered optional suicide awareness training delivered by 'Hold the Hope'. Many staff members signed up for this, and this powerful session provided valuable insights, guidance, and signposting on key topics including mental health, self-harm, and suicidal ideation, sparking meaningful discussions amongst staff

As wellbeing for all is one of our core priorities, we also hosted a Staff Wellbeing Afternoon in June. This was a great success, with staff able to enjoy a wide range of activities including karaoke, rounders, clay modelling, tennis, quizzes, and more. 


