

FOREWORD.

THIS must be a utility introduction, a bare curtain dropped before which the records that follow may parade. The proper *Spur* to which this is just a supplement contains a tribute to our departing Headmaster, and our task here is simply to set down a definitive edition of the lists and summaries which are to cover the First Seven Years.

There are two main reasons for such an attempt at comprehensive tabulation. First, Raynes Park has so far almost no past at which to look back, and indeed its tradition of looking forward has led to the neglect of records which merit preservation. Here they are collected before they have been forgotten.

Secondly, and very simply, the *Supplement* aims to aid the happy business of reminiscence. Scattered as are the pupils and friends of Raynes Park by circumstance, the details of the past are a living and very pleasant part of every one of them. There is sheer pleasure in turning up lists of names at random and letting them revive their own associations, starting the tranquil train of thought which begins "I wonder what —— is doing now?" Perhaps about the same time the *Supplement* will be acting as such a catalyst somewhere else, and if it can be of any help in reawakening such memories its creators will be proud.

Only a proportion of the activities and personalities of the First Seven Years appear here. There are many who have spent their allotted time at Raynes Park and left no memorial on the lists, but the School and the Houses within it are only the collective headings under which are assembled all the small unnoticed triumphs, the moments of inconspicuous happiness, and the obscure disappointments and miseries which are just as much a part of them as the limelight of Prize Day, the Scholarships, and success and prowess at games.

With the twin object, then, of Record and Recollection, the *Supplement* is presented for its readers' appreciation, censure, praise, correction or destruction, according to the power and the need of each.

OPENING OF THE SCHOOL.

The School started work on September 19th, 1935, with 160 boys. It was formarlly opened on November 28th, 1935, by Alderman J. Chuter Ede, D.L., J.P., M.P.

HEADMASTER'S FUND.

The following is reprinted from The Spur of July, 1940 :-

"For a long time now we have known Mr. Basil Wright as a generous friend. His advice and practical help over the purchase and use of the projector, his loan of a beautiful piano, his lectures, and his genuine interest in what we try to do, have put us deeply in his debt.

"It is now announced that the Governors have accepted a gift to the Headmaster of one thousand pounds, to be used in the interests of the School at the Headmaster's discretion. How we can thank him is a problem, for formal messages between friends mean little, and he is always such a welcome visitor that we should be hard put to it to show greater pleasure at having him than we usually do. Nothing is settled yet as to how, when and in what proportion the money shall be spent, and so perhaps we can best show our gratitude by thinking and planning for its expenditure, so that it may be put to such uses as to remind future generations of boys of Mr. Wright's benefaction, and do justice to his sympathetic belief in us.

RAYNES PARK ABROAD.

- NOTE.—The School's policy of encouraging boys to make expeditions to foreign countries was limited in its persistence by force of circumstance. Much was done, however, in the short time available, and the tradition is firmly established.
- Summer, 1937. (1) A party of six went to Germany with Mr. Beecroft to join with boys and masters of Chiswick County School in producing Macbeth. Performances were given at Bad Ems, Gressen, Hanau and Homberg; places visited included Cologne, Frankfurt, Nuremburg, Munich and Garmisch. (2) A party of 15 went to Belgium with Mr. Milton. Headquarters were at Brussels; visits were made to Antwerp, Spa, Waterloo, Liège, Laeken and Cologne.
- Easter, 1938. A European Tour was made by car by Mr. Cobb and four boys. Three thousand miles were covered in three weeks. The expedition went through France, Monaco, Italy, Switzerland, Austria and Germany. It defies summary but is fully reported in *The Spur* of July, 1938.
- Summer, 1938. (1) Austrian Tour under Mr. Milton. Visits to Basle, Boden See, Lindau, Dornbirn, Bludenz, Langen, Stuben, Brant, the Scesalplana Mountains, Bregenz, Parthenen, Abler and Zurich (18 boys).
 (2) A party went to Belgium under Mr. Grubb, Headquarters

at Brussels, Visits to Antwerp and Spa.

Easter, 1939. Mr. Milton took a party of twelve boys to La Clusaz in Haute Savoie, near Annecy. Most of the holiday was spent ski-ing on slopes near the hotel ("Au Gai Soleil") and climbing the slopes round the Col des Aravis near Mont Blanc.

POSTSCRIPT ON THE GARDEN.

In the beginning there was a rubbish-dump, and the earth was without form and void. And the County Council said, Let there be light; and builded a school thereon, after that the waters had been gathered together unto one place. And the County Council saw everything it had made, and, behold, it was very red and naked and unashamed. And the County Council said, Let there be Luff; and there was Luff. And the earth brought forth grass and the tree yielding blossom after its kind. And the County Council saw that it was good and said, Therefore shall a boy leave father and mother and cleave unto his school. And so in the one thousand nine hundred and thirty-sixth year came to the school every beast of the earth and everything that creepeth upon the earth, wherein there is life. And the Headmaster caused a garden to be planted eastward and southward and westward of the building, and in it he put the man that he had informed. And out of the ground grew every tree and herb that is pleasant to the sight and good for food. And in the school grew the tree of life and the tree of knowledge of good and evil. But at first there was not found an help meet for the man. But it came to pass that Cane and Abol made the plants to sustain their fruits and to shrivel the pestilence. And the Headmaster forbade that the boy should walk on the borders or hurt the trees; but they did, so that he causd to be placed at the corners holly and prickly trees and archways with roses with thorns which turned every way to keep the way of the tree of life. Now the clay of this land is good and on the Rock Garden is sandstone and Westmorland stone, but the river that went past the garden watered not the garden. Now the gifts of parents, masters and especially of the Headmaster were manifold, but the cultivation of Adam was imperfect; Helenium followed Azalea and Hemerocallis Alstoemeria; Ceanothus lived two years and died, giving place to Lonicera and Clematis, Iris, Phlox and Erica, until four hundred and five kinds and one hundred and sixty families live in the garden. Then did Doolan find grace in the eyes of the Headmaster; and as he walked in the cool of the day he said unto Doolan, Make thee a greenhouse of gopher wood, and thou shalt pitch it within, though the boys pitch missiles from without, and all sorts shalt thou take into the greenhouse to keep them And now that the earth is filled with violence, he said unto Beecroft, Take thou unto thee of all food that is eaten—potato, tomato, celery, spinach and carrot—and thou shalt gather it unto thee and it shall be for food for thee and for all. Thus did Beecroft and his helpers according to all that Buckhurst instructed them, so did they. And this garden be the token of the covenant between the husbandmen and the Headmaster for perpetual generations.
