
Opening day was marked with a series of events, starting with a visit by pupils from West Wimbledon Primary School, who joined us for a creative writing session led by our students.

POETRY PRIZE

Congratulations to Juliet in Year 8, who has been placed in the top 100 for The Foyle Young Poets of the Year Award 2023! This is a fantastic achievement for Juliet, with her poem chosen from over 15,800 entries from as far afield as Romania, New Zealand, and Trinidad and Tobago. The top 100 winning poets were announced at a ceremony at Shakespeare's Globe on 5th October, and the winners all received a year's youth membership of The Poetry Society and a bag full of books. AWARDS EVENING: KS4/5





YEAR 7 TEAMBUILDING DAY






At the start of term — on a gloriously sunny day — our new cohort of Year 7's took part in a teambuilding day, designed to develop new friendships and foster team-working skills.

HUMANITIES WEEK







Humanities Week took place from 16th-19th October and saw students from across the Year groups getting involved in a wide range of events.

The week was planned to coincide with Black History Month. This takes place nationwide throughout October and is designed to raise awareness of historical figures who may otherwise remain unrecognised. Staff have been acknowledging Black History in lessons, for example in Geography, by considering how European countries have been shaped by immigration. Also on offer were online quizzes, research and writing tasks, and activities designed to encourage us to notice aspects of our surroundings which may often go unnoticed, for example, the many trees on the school site.

For Year 8 students, the highlight of the week was a visit from ZooLab. Fitting in nicely with the students' current ecosystems unit, the ZooLab ranger brought the tropical rainforest to life with a selection of animals which they were able to study, touch and hold. The presentation really helped highlight the significance of rainforests to the biodiversity and wellbeing of the planet.

STEM WEEK



It was a great pleasure to support Burlington Primary School during its STEM week, which focused on 'Structures'.

Their Year 4 and 5 students had the opportunity to join our Science and DT departments in a very special set of lessons. In science, they focused on the very smallest structures, looking at atoms, elements and mixtures, to give a greater insight in to how the world is created. In DT, Mr Harris and Mr Robinson challenged the Burlington students to make the tallest paper totem pole. First the students were divided into groups of six and then they were taught key concepts about structures. They could then apply this knowledge to build and reinforce their own totem pole structures. Whilst this seemed relatively straightforward there were other challenges, such as the fact that students had limited materials with which to create the totem poles. They also had to design a totem pole that could withstand a wind test to be the ultimate winner.

When all the students had completed their designs for the tallest and strongest totem pole, two of the best designs were selected to compete against each other. The totem poles were tested rigorously and the results were absolutely amazing. It was clear that the students had really pushed their problem-solving skills and the enjoyment in the challenge was evident by all the amazing outcomes. The students were so impressive, there are certainly some engineers of the future at Burlington Primary School!


SCIENCE UPDATE

It has been a very busy term in the Science department, both in and out of the classroom. In classrooms, the students have been doing a great number of practicals to enrich their learning and see the theory they have been taught. Alongside their lessons, there have been many trips and events to inspire students to continue their love for science beyond the classroom.

New Scientist Live

A-Level Biology and Psychology students attended New Scientist Live at The ExCeL, London. There were four stages with shows, presentations and lectures. The highlight of the speeches was a live stream to the International Space Station where students were able to have a Q&A with the ISS Chief Commander.

There were also lots of really exciting companies and universities presenting their own research and latest scientific technologies. Students got to build compounds, trial medical procedures and test their balance, contributing to studies at universities.







In₂Science

A Level Science and BTEC Applied Science students in Year 12 had an assembly and workshop by In2Science, a company that empowers young people to achieve their potential through life changing opportunities that give them insights in to STEM careers and research, and boosts their skills and confidence. The students will now have support from In2Science and the RPHS Science department to apply for these experiences that will look fantastic when applying for university or employment after Sixth Form.

The Science Museum

GCSE Triple Science students have been to the Science Museum for a work experience event co-created with Marvel Studios, the NHS, National Grid and several universities, where students got the opportunity to hear from a technician currently working at Imperial College London. The students were then given the afternoon to explore the diverse and interactive galleries, including the David Sainsbury Gallery of Technicians. It was an excellent opportunity for students to see where studying Science in Sixth Form and beyond can lead them.

'It was really interesting being able to practice taking and analysing samples for a virus. I loved being able to work completely independently and compare data with other groups to reach my own conclusions. It was a great insight into working in a lab in the future.'



Gardening Club


Gardening Club has been a continued success with students getting the garden ready for winter after a bumper harvest of pumpkins, potatoes and more.

STEM Club

STEM Club is a very exciting club that is gaining more members every week. Students have applied their scientific and mathematical skills to the designing and building of various structures, for example Aerodynamics, Building Bridges and even 'egg parachutes'. The latest design has been to build (and test) balloon-powered cars. Year 12 students have supported these sessions admirably, developing a diverse set of skills. One of the most committed students, Honey, said that

'I love STEM Club because it lets me explore all different kinds of science that I wouldn't always get to see as much of in lessons. I really enjoyed making the hovercraft vehicles, it was a great way for me to combine my love for Science and Art.'

Noah, a newer student to STEM Club has created his own model of a hydrocarbon using materials from home – we love the design!







King's College Aspirations

This term, we have been taking a small group of Year 8 students to Kings' College School to take part in the Science Aspirations Course. The students really enjoyed their experiences as you can see from their comments below:

'One of my favourite parts of the Science Aspirations Course at King's College was the flame tests we did in our last chemistry workshop, even though my group didn't do very well on the quiz at the end! The lab turned into a haze of colour – green, red and pink – as we mixed different unlabelled chemicals with fire to try and identify them. I think that my personal favourite was the copper sulphate, as it turned the flame a bright, emerald green, unlike anything I'd ever seen before.'

'One of the most memorable and interesting practicals that we did at the King's College Science Aspirations course was when we used red cabbage as an indicator to help us determine the pH of different


solutions. We were given some solutions ranging from very acidic to very alkaline and we added a bit of red cabbage to the solutions to find out their pH. The solutions changed to different colours of the pH scale, which showed us if they were acids or alkalis. We also had a fun competition where each team had to make a green, neutral solution by mixing acids and alkalis together. The group whose neutral solution was a green identical to the green of water with a pH of 7 won!'

'On the first week of the King's College course, we participated in an activity where we were given the chance to figure out how to make an egg drop without cracking using specific resources. It was a very fun time as I was able to have fun with my peers and I learnt something new about Science. In the end, our egg did crack, however it was an incredibly fun time and I wouldn't mind doing it again.'

Aragon Primary School Humanities Week




The school canteen proudly featured a selection of delicious black ethnic foods, offering students the chance to experience and savour the traditional flavours and culinary delights of black cultures.


















BOOKFEST WINNERS

WELLBEING IN SCHOOL







How have we been promoting wellbeing in school?

Promoting positive mental health and wellbeing continues to be a large priority for us at RPHS and we continue to work closely alongside local external agencies to provide 1-to-1 and group support to students of all Year groups.

In September we restarted our school's LGBTQIA+ club, this takes place on Fridays during 1st break in the library and is kindly led by Ms Sleet. This club is a safe space where all are welcome so please feel free to drop in should you ever want to! Thank you to Ms Sleet for leading on this.

Peer mentoring also restarted this term and we want to thank all students who are involved, particularly the mentors for all of their hard work and engagement with this. We are incredibly proud of you! Thank you so much also to Mr Wheel and Ms Thumwood for leading on this.

In September, a number of students also began working with the Sistem Arts programme outside of school. These students have been working closely alongside each other and students from other local schools to devise a piece which they performed live for audience members earlier in December. A huge shout-out to all of the students who took part in this!

In October and November, Joshua Eldridge, a Clinical Psychologist from the NHS, visited us to deliver introductory sessions and assemblies to Year 11 and Sixth Form students on the topic of Exam Stress. Joshua will be back in next term, alongside some of our Educational Wellbeing Practitioners (EWPs), to deliver bespoke Exam

Stress Workshops to particular Year 11 and Sixth Form students. If you would like more information on how to attend one of these, please let Ms Yusuf know. In November, as well as taking part in drop-down lessons surrounding Exam Stress, the Year 11's also took part in a drop-down day focusing on the key topics of Relationships and Consent. The feedback from this drop-down day was extremely positive and we are so impressed with some of the conversations that this encouraged. Thank you so much to all teachers who assisted in the delivery of this!

Finally, at the end of November, all Year groups took part in completing Wellbeing questionnaires. These questionnaires have been reviewed by the Inclusion and Safeguarding team here at school and students may receive follow-up conversations in January, so that your Year team can see how best to support you in school, if needed. In the interim, should you ever want to access some support please do reach out to your tutor, Year team or a member of the Safeguarding team via the Worry boxes, ShoutOut link, in person or via the Safeguarding email address at safe@raynespark.merton.sch.uk

December started with a bang here at RPHS and the run up to Christmas brought with it a heap of fun and educational activities, alongside drop-down days. On the 7th and 13th December we hosted drop-down days for our Year 9's and 10's,

covering many important topics. The LMK (Let Me Know) charity delivered workshops to our students on issues surrounding healthy relationships; St Giles Trust joined us to deliver an assembly on the topic of County lines, gangs and grooming; and finally the Daniel Spargo Foundation gave an assembly to students on the science and impact of substance misuse and risky behaviours. We are incredibly grateful to be able to work so closely with these external agencies and were very excited to host these dropdown days, covering such important subjects for our students.
