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Dear Families,

**Welcome to the final edition of our
newsletter for this academic year.**

This is usually the time I would reflect on key events from the year and outline areas we will be turning our attention to but with the sudden closure of the school site, we began operation as a 'virtual school' for the majority of students with effect from Monday 23rd March 2020.

120,000 pieces of work set on Show My Homework

Over 200 induction packs produced for Year 6 families to collect

36 laptops distributed as part of the DfE offer to schools

Leavers Hoodies distributed to Year 11

Centre-Assessed Grades submitted for every student in Years 11 and 13

Over 1000 Community Boxes delivered to families since April

Over 1000 PPE visors produced

Shopping vouchers distributed to families of students eligible for free meals

Since then, our focus has been on sustaining the curriculum through home learning, whilst maintaining the well-being of our students, their families and the wider community, and we have attempted to put in place as many strategies to support our students as possible.

This year has been like no other so I thought I would share some of the things we have been doing since lockdown in March.

We have:

- Continued to provide care and supervision for children of key workers and some of our most vulnerable students, remaining open during the Easter break and May half-term
- Set 120,000 pieces of work on Show My Homework
- Planned and delivered lessons via Teams as part of our Remote Teaching Pilot
- Provided over 200 printed copies of the Show My Homework tasks
- Made regular phone calls home to our students to check on their well-being
- Distributed 36 laptops as part of the DfE offer to schools
- Produced 220 induction packs for Year 6 families to collect
- Distributed Leavers Hoodies to Year 11
- Held a remote transition event for our new Year 12 students
- Entered Centre-Assessed Grades for every student in Year 11 and Year 13
- Distributed more than 1000 Community Boxes to families since April

- Produced over 1000 PPE visors
- Distributed shopping vouchers to families of students who are on free school meals with additional vouchers distributed to cover the summer holiday period
- Responded to any contacts requiring support via help@raynespark.merton.sch.uk
- Co-ordinated the work of speech and language therapists, educational psychologists and social workers to deliver essential interventions
- Sent numerous surveys to staff and families to help us plan for the wider re-opening

To enable us to open more widely for students in Years 10 and 12 from 15th June, we have:

- Put in place a detailed Risk Assessment to mitigate possible risks to staff and students
- Transformed the school building, established minimalist classrooms and reviewed our provisions to ensure they met the arrangements as set out in our risk assessment;
- Welcomed over 100 students in Years 10 and 12 for face-to-face sessions with subject staff
- Welcomed an additional 150 students in Years 7, 8 and 9 for the opportunity to meet their Form Tutor
- Since lockdown, we have not had to send home a member of staff or student with COVID19-like symptoms

At the end of this Summer Term it certainly does feel that over the last 17 weeks more than a decade of events has happened. None of us would have thought when we came back to school in January that the nation would be in lockdown, the school would be shut for the foreseeable future and that public examinations would be cancelled.

As the term progressed, it became increasingly clear that we would not be in a position to run events in the usual way and whilst we have been hugely disappointed to have had to cancel transition activities for Year 7 and Year 12, and not be able to see families at various events, we fully appreciate the very valid reasons for this. However, we have been able to make calls to all of the new Year 7s in addition to them receiving an induction pack, hold a remote induction day for Year 12 and we plan to hold a remote Information Evening for families in September.

The last few weeks has been a frenetic time, as we scrambled to respond to the latest developments, and endeavoured to keep staff, students and parents fully aware of both the national picture and the school's response. There have been over 130 announcements regarding education and we hope that we have kept everyone fully informed without overwhelming you. The government has announced funding for 'catch-up' and tuition, but again there is very little precise detail about this. Once this is known, we will of course inform you of our plans. The same goes for next summer's public examinations and

we are awaiting the outcome of the most recent consultation that closed this week.

The face-to-face support sessions for Year 10 and Year 12 have continued to take place and these have all been led by students' subject teachers, as we felt it was important to maintain the link between the teacher and student in order to build on the online programme and Teams pilot. Students commented on how they felt both challenged to re-engage with exam content and skills, and reassured by the measures taken by the school to ensure everyone's safety. We have also enjoyed welcoming students in Years 7, 8 and 9 to meet with their Form Tutor before the summer holidays. It has been an absolute pleasure to see some of our students in school again and the responses to the social distancing measures and amended behavioural expectations bodes well for September.

Our thoughts have now turned to finalising our plans for the exam results days in August. The Centre-Assessed Grades have been submitted to the exam boards and are subject to moderation and scrutiny by the boards and Ofqual. Students in Year 13 will receive results on 13th August and Year 11 on 20th August. We have reluctantly taken the decision to hold these remotely and these families will receive additional information about specific arrangements for these days.

At an unprecedented time like this, with still so much uncertainty, it is natural to be worried

TEENTECH AWARDS

It is a double for D&T – Raynes Park High School Design & Technology Department Awarded Gold in the TeenTech Centre of Innovation Awards 2020 and Year 10 GCSE D&T students receive Bronze in the TeenTech Competition.

This year, the Year 10 D&T students took on the TeenTech Awards. Working in teams of up to three, they completed projects that consider areas of contemporary life, looking for better ways of doing things. Raynes Park High School students focused on the future of transportation category. This category challenged students to think about: What will the future of transport look like? How could journeys by road, rail, sea or air be made better, simpler, safer or more enjoyable for both passengers and staff?

This is the first year the students have entered this design competition and impressively all students that entered were lucky enough to receive bronze certificates. The submissions attracted the following impressive comments from the judges:

'I like your idea of creating a car that will not run on fossil fuels like petrol or diesel and your drawing skills are very impressive!'

'A really fantastic challenge to tackle. Petrol and diesel pollution is one of the biggest contributors to the global CO2 emissions.'

'A good sound idea that utilises a lot of existing infrastructure like petrol stations.'

As well as this great achievement, the D&T department received a gold award. The TeenTech Centre of Innovation – Gold Award was given in recognition of the D&T departments development in excellent programmes and initiatives within their own school, supporting students with project based, extra-curricular opportunities which develop core skills of creativity, communication, teamwork, collaboration and tenacity.




YEAR 7 LOCKDOWN ART

NEWS FROM THE Governors

By any standards, this has been an extraordinary term. Like everyone connected with Raynes Park High School, Governors have had to adapt our expectations and ways of working to the new environment. It has been heart-warming and encouraging to see the leadership given by Mrs Heard, by her senior team and by so many teachers. They have shown ingenuity, flexibility and dedication in continuing to deliver education to as many of our students as possible. They have demonstrated the caring commitment which is a central feature of our school.

The Governing Body has joined the Zoom generation and we have held two full Governors' meetings and two committee meetings in this way. Our job has, as ever, been to offer support and challenge to our staff. We were pleased to see the arrangements in place for accommodating our vulnerable and keyworker students. We have been very keen that in parallel, online education opportunities should be developed, and it has been good to see this achieved through Show My Homework and latterly via Microsoft Teams. There is still a problem in securing laptops and IT access for some of our families and we have continued to work on this with the school.

In the run-up to the partial return on 15th June, we studied and approved the Headteacher's plans and the risk assessment enabling groups of our Year 10s and 12s to come to classes. We have also been keen to encourage continued contact with our students in Years 7, 8 and 9 and with those coming to Raynes Park High School

for the first time in September. The work our Year Tutors have done on this – especially with our vulnerable students, has been outstanding.

On the membership front, Governors have been pleased to welcome Hannah Davidson as a new Co-opted Governor. Hannah is herself a teacher in central London but lives locally and she has already been demonstrating great enthusiasm and commitment in her new role. On a sadder note, we will be saying goodbye at the end of term to Marina Szanto, an ex-Headteacher, who has been an outstanding Chair of our Standards & Quality Committee.

This has been an exceptional period. But I am grateful to my colleagues for the help and support they have given, whether in finding a way through the mass of guidance issued by the Department for Education on a daily, sometimes twice daily, basis, or in contributing generously, as a number have done, to the school's community box scheme for our families. It has been a testing time. But Raynes Park High School has withstood the storm, tackled the issues and is emerging the stronger from our experiences.
