

DEAR FAMILIES

At the end of each term, it always give me great pleasure to share the incredible achievements of our students, both in and out of school, and I hope you enjoy reading about the many events the students have taken part in since January.

There is much to celebrate and I would like to thank the teaching staff, the support staff and the Governing Body for their hard work, on-going support and commitment to RPHS. I would also like to thank parents and carers for your support and feedback that is always welcome.

Balancing student well-being and individual needs against the high academic expectations that are placed upon students

continues to underpin my vision for the school and with that in mind, we have prioritised wellbeing for staff and students. The students all took part in the PASS Survey (Pupil Attitudes to School and Self) before Christmas and we have spent this term identifying and working with students who require additional support, whether that be due to anxiety, managing behaviour or barriers to learning. The staff wellbeing team have also ensured that there have been opportunities to support

colleagues at what is undoubtedly a difficult time in education; recruitment remains a challenge for all schools and my thanks go to the staff for their additional support.

Attendance has also remained a key focus, both at RPHS and on a national level, and I am delighted to report that our attendance has remained above national average throughout the term. In line with DfE guidance, we have met with a number of families to agree targets that will support improved attendance and we have also seen punctuality to school continue to improve despite the challenges posed by public transport and road works in the local area.

The Spring Term always sees the majority of our Parent/Carer Evenings in the calendar and these have remained online using SchoolCloud. Whilst I remain traditional and enjoy face to face events, our survey last year indicated that families preferred the flexibility of online meetings with subject staff and I am pleased to report that attendance at these events has remained high this year.

This term, the Senior Leadership Team and Heads of Department have undertaken a comprehensive review of student books following curriculum reviews last term. We have been very impressed with the quality of work and feedback, and the excellent presentation seen in the vast majority of exercise books demonstrates the positive attitude to learning that students display.

1st March was National Offer Day when Year 6 families received information about school allocations for September 2024. We are delighted to see an increase in the number of applications to RPHS and we will now look forward to hosting a range of induction events next term as we prepare to welcome our new cohort of students in September.

As usual, we will start the Summer Term preparing for the examination season and there is a comprehensive intervention programme running throughout the Easter holiday. I am so very grateful to staff for leading these sessions and I know the students will find these helpful. I would also like to wish Year 11 and 13 students the very best of luck as they prepare for their Public Examinations that start in May.

We finish the term with assemblies where we will be celebrating the achievements of year groups, Houses and individual students, and I am delighted that the Headteacher Awards this term have gone to Zoe in Year 11 and Temira in Year 9 for their outstanding contribution to the school and their achievements beyond the classroom. We will also be saying farewell to Ms Carr, Ms Howlett and Mr Hearne; they have all made a valuable contribution during their time at RPHS and we wish them all the best. I would also like to congratulate Mr Arnot on his successful appointment as Head of Year 9 and he will start in his new role next term.

Over the last month, 26 Year 9 students have been rehearsing for their 'Curtain Raiser' performance at the Globe Theatre. We have had two theatre practitioners from the Globe Theatre come in to run rehearsal workshops to prepare for the opening night.

Students created a five-minute performance of the opening scene of Romeo and Juliet ready to open the show. Our students were one of 50 schools in London who auditioned for this opportunity. On the night of the performance there were over 200 audience members. Students have made both us

and themselves very proud, in representing Raynes Park High School at the Globe.

Since the start of the year, cast and crew members have been in rehearsals for Footloose twice a week after school, preparing for the performances in the summer term. This year there are over 150 students taking part as cast and crew.

The Shakespeare Schools Festival performance took place on Thursday 14th March. For the last few months, our selected group of Year 8 students have been rehearsing for their performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream at The Exchange Theatre in Twickenham. The night

of the performance saw 150 audience members, with students representing the school and the Drama department superbly.

For the King's College Community Choir Project, 23 students from KS3 have been rehearsing for their final performance at King's College, alongside many other schools in Merton. The students have been attending rehearsals at King's College and working extremely hard to sound perfect for the show. 












POETRY PRIZE

Out of over 3,000 entries, we are incredibly proud that Year 11 student Zoe's poem was selected as one of the 17 finalists in the first Black History Month poetry competition. The theme of this competition was 'Saluting our sisters', focusing on the contributions and achievements of black women.

On 21st March, she was invited to an awards ceremony at the House of Commons, where she was able to explore the beautiful building as well as observing a debate taking place in the chamber. The event was hosted by Marsha Da Cordova, the MP for Battersea, who spoke of the importance of all voices being heard. The Children's Laureate Joseph Coello was also in attendance, describing the impact that the poems had on him. Zoe received a plaque to celebrate her achievement and her poem will appear in an anthology later in the year. The event ended by looking forward to next year, when the theme of Black History Month will be 'reclaiming narratives'. We look forward to the opportunity to correct political inaccuracies and showcase the untold success stories and full complexity of Black heritage.



MATHS UPDATE


In a busy Spring Term for Maths, RPHS students put in impressive performances in two prestigious competitions

In February we hosted the regional finals of the Year 10 Maths Feast, a national team maths competition which tests problem-solving and teamwork skills. This was the biggest event yet, with 27 teams participating, three of which were from Raynes Park, and a large number of our 6th Form mathematicians supported the running of the day. All of our students worked brilliantly well together in their teams and should be proud of what they achieved. Well done to all who took part!

In January over 35 of our most able mathematicians from Years 10 and 11 (plus one of our Year 9s!) took part in the Intermediate Maths Challenge. This 60-minute challenge encourages reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The students did extremely well and all can be proud of what they achieved. Seven students achieved a Gold Certificate and four of our Year 11s qualified for the Pink Kangaroo - the next round which took place on Thursday 21st March. Special congratulations go to Loic who has been invited to participate in the 2024 National Mathematics Summer School!

RPHS aims for gold in the 2024 BAFTA Young Game Designers Competition





How have we been promoting wellbeing in school?

Promoting positive mental health and wellbeing continues to be a large priority for us at RPHS and we continue to work closely alongside local external agencies to provide 1-to-1 and group support to students of all year groups.

In January we kicked off the term by welcoming in our Educational Wellbeing Practitioners (EWP's) to deliver bespoke Exam Stress Workshops to identified Year 11 and Sixth Form students.

These sessions allowed students to gain some psycho-education surrounding the stress they may face around coursework and exam time, whilst learning some practical skills to help them manage their wellbeing during this time.

Ahead of Childrens Mental Health week from the 5th-11th February, we also welcomed in Cassim Kaweesa from Kooth. Cassim delivered assemblies to year groups regarding the signs of poor mental health, why it is important to take care of your own mental health and also strategies to manage stress and wellbeing.

In February, we once again celebrated LGBTQIA+ history month. At the end of January, in the lead up to the month, the SEND and Access departments received training regarding sexuality and gender, to provide them with the knowledge and skills to further diversify their support to students and ensure inclusive practice. A huge shout-out to Ms Sleet specifically from the Access Centre for all of her work with the school's LGBTQIA+ club. The LGBTQIA+ club takes place on Fridays during first break in the Library and operates an open door policy, welcome for all! Please do feel free to drop in or contact Ms Sleet or Ms Yusuf should you be interested in hearing more about this.

During the month of February for LGBTQIA+ History Month, and with the hard work of staff and students, RPHS managed to raise a whopping £292 for key LGBQIA+ charities. Thank you so much to you all for getting involved during this month, especially to those who took part in the Student vs Staff football match!

In March we welcomed St Giles Trust who delivered after-school professional training to the Pastoral, Safeguarding and Social Sciences teams on the topics of gangs, county lines and serious youth violence. We continue to work closely with St Giles Trust in our drop down days and with our mentor Isha Rahman who visits once a week to ensure students receive the best support in ensuring their safety and wellbeing.





YOUNG ENTERPRISE FAIR














SPORTS UPDATE
